- 1.1 (e) What are the functional requirements of an injection system? What is the purpose of a fuel injector? Mention the various parts of an injector assembly.

Fuel injector is used to supply fuel in I.C engine. This is mainly used in CI engine where compressed air is mixed with high pressure fuel in combustion chamber and combustion takes place. The compressed air have very high pressure hence injected fuel pressure should be very high. Injection takes place through multiple injector system for proper mixing of fuel. as the pressure of the injected fuel is high more velocity of the injected fuel and hence more turbulence will be created during mixing of air-fuel mixture hence more easily atomisation will takes place which

which result in less chemical delay & ignition delay during combustion of the mixture.

The opening valve of injector should be rough so that more easily atomisation will take place and combustion will be smooth and less chances of knocking during combustion.
